MAGNIFICENT DEDICATION TO FALLEN POLICE OFFICERS

Civic buildings throughout Scotland, Northern Ireland, England and Wales were illuminated blue on the eve of NPMD 2021, providing a stunning dedication to fallen police officers.

Due to restrictions on attendance levels in Lincoln due to Covid, forces went all out to commemorate locally, with special acts of remembrance taking place simultaneously throughout the country.

A POIGNANT DAY OF REMEMBRANCE, LINCOLN 2021

The 18th National Police Memorial Day was held at Lincoln Cathedral on Sunday 26 September 2021.

Home Secretary, the Rt Hon Priti Patel, and Metropolitan Police Commissioner, Dame Cressida Dick DBE QPM were amongst those who joined a small congregation. Covid restrictions meant numbers were limited at a physical event but there was a wealth of support for our online service and special acts of remembrance took place simultaneously throughout the country.



In the commemorative brochure, NPMD Patron, HRH The Prince of Wales said: "As a nation, we continue to face the challenges caused by an indiscriminate virus that has impacted all our lives. As we emerge from the restrictions of the past year and return to some form of normality, we are forever grateful for the steadfast dedication to duty of our police officers who have adapted and worked so tirelessly amidst the ever-changing circumstances throughout this period."

The Service included readings from Home Secretary Priti Patel, Sergeant Harvinder Singh Rai (President, National Sikh Police Association), and Zahra Zakaria (Chair of the Muslim Police Association), with Dame Cressida Dick providing the main address.

During the service, prayers were led by Annie Coker, widow of Detective Constable John Raymond Coker, who died from Covid 19 on 17 April 2020; and Darryl Codling, son of Inspector Ray Codling, who was fatally shot in 1989.

Candles were lit by relatives who mourn their loved ones and in remembrance of officers throughout the country who have lost their lives.



Representing England, Jayne Clemson, daughter of Constable Ray Davenport, Merseyside Police, who sustained fatal injuries on 4 July 1981 having been dragged along the road by a stolen vehicle.

Representing Northern Ireland, Andrea Brown, daughter of RUC Sergeant Eric Brown, Royal Ulster Constabulary George Cross, fatally shot by terrorist gunmen in 1983. Andrea was accompanied by her sister, Michelle McBride.

Representing Wales, Rhianydd Gardiner, great niece of Constable Noel Alexander, who died in 1964 due to injuries sustained while taking part in a police training exercise.

Representing Scotland, Faye Buggins, widow of Constable Roy Buggins, Police Scotland, who collapsed and died on duty in 2019.

Police Federation of England and Wales' National Chair, John Apter read the names of officers who have lost their lives during the past year: Sergeant Paul Keany, Northamptonshire Police; Constable Christopher Miller, Metropolitan Police; Sergeant Matiu Ratana, Metropolitan Police; Constable Thomas White, Police Scotland; Constable Darryl Street, Civil Nuclear Constabulary; and Constable Quamar Zaman, Greater Manchester Police.

There was silence as petals of remembrance, representing all who have lost their lives, descended from the gallery as the orchestra played 'Abide with Me' and the Last Post was sounded. Chief Constable of Lincolnshire Police, Chris Haward, read the Act of Dedication before the final Blessing was given by the Bishop of Lincoln.
